For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope.

Jeremiah 29:11

The past month I have been immersed in the journey of aging and end-of-life care for my parents. It has been a challenging, humbling, unsettling, and tender time. The journey continues for my parents, but I have returned home while another sibling has taken over. None of us knows the circumstances under which we will face the end of our lives or when that will come, but it is tempting to become so preoccupied with obligations and distractions in life that we avoid the creeping reality of aging and the inevitable progression toward the conclusion of this earthly existence—if, that is, we are fortunate enough to have a life long enough to experience aging. In truth, we are "aging" from the day we are born, but at some point—different for everyone—the scales tip from acquiring things, experiences, relationships to letting go and, eventually, letting go even to this earthly life itself. We came into this world completely vulnerable as infants and, for many of us, the full arc of human existence will return us once again to a state of vulnerability and a process of letting go.

Our Christian faith is built on vulnerability, although we don't always want to see or acknowledge that. Jesus embodied vulnerability. He entered the world as an infant and died at the hands of others—mocked, scorned, and hung on a cross. Jesus embraced vulnerability because in it was true strength, strength that came from trusting completely in God at work. That was revealed most dramatically in the resurrection. For us, trusting in God also requires vulnerability, a willingness to believe that God's plans for us really are for our welfare and not for harm, that it is God's desire to give us a future bright with hope. Letting go of that which is no longer realistic and accepting our vulnerability is ultimately the path to being born into new life.

An Eventful Summer for Episcopalians and Anglicans Worldwide!

This summer brought together bishops and delegates for both The 80th General Convention of the Episcopal Church and the international Lambeth Conference.

The 80th General Convention of the Episcopal Church was held July 8-11 in Baltimore, Maryland. This brings together bishops and elected lay delegates from every diocese of the church. For a summary of actions, resolutions, elections, budget information, and videos of the 80th meeting of the General Convention, go to www.generalconvention.org. This year in addition to Bishop Bob, the lay delegation included Kim Arakawa, Ryan Kusumoto, Mary Carpenter, Faye Hee, and Willis Moore, and the clergy delegation included Steve Costa, Alison Dingley, Keleawe Hee, Jenn Latham, Paul Lillie, and Hau'oli Tomoso. Usually held every three years, this General Convention was delayed a year due to COVID. The next General Convention, therefore, will be in 2024 in Louisville, Kentucky.

The international Lambeth Conference was convened by the Archbishop of Canterbury from July 26th through August 7th and took place at the University of Kent, Canterbury Cathedral, and Lambeth Palace. Held approximately every ten years since 1867, the Lambeth Conference brings together Episcopal and Anglican bishops from around the world to discuss church and world affairs and the global mission of the Anglican Communion in the decade to come. This year about 650 Anglican bishops—including more than 100 Episcopal bishops—were in attendance. The conference theme was "God's Church for God's World—Walking, Listening and Witnessing Together." Together the Bishops explored what it means for the Anglican Communion to be responsive to the needs of a 21st century world.


